## W.C.R.O. Will of Jone Smythe of Lighthorne 1538

In the Name of God Amen the 23rd day of February in the year of our Lord 1538 I Jone Smythe of Lighthorne widow late the wife of John Smythe in the same town husbandman in the County of Warwick whole in mind and soul but sick in body make this my Last Will in form following.

First I bequeath my soul to God and my body to be buried in the church of Lighthorne before the image of our Lady by my husband.

Item I bequeath to the church for the breaking of the ground 6s.8d.

Item I bequeath to Robert Sale one pot one pound one mattress one coverlet one blanket two pair of sheets one table cloth one towel two platters one candlestick a yolk of bullocks when he sets up husbandry a mare and a colt.

Item I bequeath to Thomas Sale a heiffer.

Item I bequeath to my brother Edmond Ematts children every one of them a sheep.

Item I bequeath to every one of my godchildren 4d.

Item I bequeath to every house in Lighthorne that goes without a plough 4d.

Item to every priest at my burial 4d.

Item I bequeath to my brother Lawrence Mason 3s.4d. The residue of my goods not bequeathed I give to my son John Smythe whom I make full or sole executor that my will be performed and he to have for his labour 6s.8d. and his two children two heiffers and two platters.

Item I charge my son John Smythe whom I make my executor to pay to Thomas his brother £3 which was his fathers bequest.

These being witnesses Robert Alexander (curate?) Lawrence Mason Alyn Reynolds John Burton and John Reynolds

Proved at Stratford in the chapell of Holy Trinity there before Master Roland Taylor doctor at law for Lord Hugh Bishop of Worcester Commissary 12 September A.D.1538 the executor having been sworn.
